Open the Word

Paul's world

WEB Read the background material on Paul and life in Thessalonica.

Print out copies of this week's Paul's world – life in Thessalonica Sheet For the children to read, or hold one up, read out the text and show them the pictures. Start with the Life today questions, then use the Imagine section to take children back into Paul's first-century world. This week, we learn about the difficult situations that many living in Paul's time had to cope with.



Present the reading Open the Bible at 1 Thessalonians 4.13-14,18

Paul reminds us that when sad things happen, Jesus gives us hope.

Choose from these two ways of exploring a 'nugget' of Paul's teaching.

These words Before reading the passage, practise the following actions for key words: died – fall flat on the floor; grieve – pretend to cry; hope/encourage – cheer; Jesus – point upwards; rose again – jump up. Read the passage again, a bit faster, and challenge the children to keep up!

Highlight emotions Print out a copy of the passage for each child, and give each child two different coloured highlighters. Ask them to highlight in one colour any words that are sad, and in the other colour, any happy or hopeful words. Discuss together that sad and happy words are both part of this one short passage.

Paul's first letter to the Thessalonians, Chapter 4, verses 13,14 and 18

But we do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, so that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died.

Therefore encourage one another with these words.

- Why does Paul say that we can have hope when people die?
- · Have you ever felt happy and sad at the same time?
- Do you know anyone who is feeling sad? What could you do to help them feel more hopeful?

For very young children

Play and think about the belief that all who have died will be with God.

Play materials: shiny materials, to represent God's glory, e.g. tinsel, silver foil, mirrors, gold wrapping paper.

Storytelling

Use a glove, finger or wooden spoon puppet for Paul, as he talks to his friends:

This week I would like to tell you a special message, to give you hope.

Do you remember the story about how Jesus died on the cross? And how he rose again and went up to heaven to be with God? Well, we believe that, through Jesus, God will bring those who have died to be with him in heaven.

Play

Give each child a teardrop-shaped stamp, or make some from potatoes. Provide blue paint and a large sheet of paper for the children to print their shapes onto. Allow the paint to dry. When you come back to it, see if the children can remember what the shapes are. Then give out coloured watered-down paints for them to paint a rainbow over the top of the teardrops. Talk about the rainbow as a sign of hope.

Create

Provide sparkly, bright, colourful craft materials and a large sheet of paper. Invite the children to create a collage, representing heaven as they see it.

Praise

Sing or listen to the chorus of the song (link on was) and invite the children to wave gold streamers while singing.

Prav

Offer children the chance to light a battery-operated tealight for anyone they know who has died.

Then pray:

We pray to you for all those people we love but see no longer.
May they rest in peace.
