#### **Election of Elders 2025**

This month we begin the important process of electing Elders to serve at Trinity. We currently face a significant challenge with up to eight vacancies to fill on Elders' Council - three current Elders will be standing down after completing their terms of service, three are eligible for re-election, and we



have two existing vacancies. Without new Elders coming forward, our Council could be reduced to just five serving Elders, which would make it difficult to fulfil all the responsibilities of leadership and support that are so vital to our church life.

The role of Elder is a crucial one in our tradition. Elders share with the Minister in providing spiritual leadership and pastoral care to the congregation. Together, they oversee Trinity's worship, mission and witness. Being an Elder is both a privilege and a responsibility - a calling to serve God and our church community.



Nomination papers will be available from Sunday 12 January. We ask you to prayerfully consider whether you know of someone with the gifts and calling to serve as an Elder. Each nomination requires the support of five church members, and nominees must themselves be

church members. The election of new Elders will take place at a special Church Meeting after morning worship on Sunday 23 March.

If you would like to know more about what being an Elder involves before considering who you might nominate, please speak with any current Elder or with Jacob. They would be very happy to share their experience and answer any questions you may have.

Have you seen Trinity's new Cradle Roll? It is displayed in the vestry corridor, alongside the previous three editions. The rolls record every baptism that takes place at Trinity.



The new artwork represents the tree of life and features Trinity's rose window, a dove of peace and the words of the blessing which is always sung at baptisms. It was created by Elizabeth Reid, the local artist who also painted the watercolour of Trinity in 2003. Do take a look.




# The early days of Trinity's Sunday School - and the Shorter Catechism

Just five months after the first services of 'Trinity Presbyterian Church' it was realised that 'the most important of all organisations connected with a Church is the Sunday School'.

So it was that on a May Sunday afternoon in 1884 'a few members of the Church and one boy' met in the Drill Hall in St George's Road, the very first meeting of Trinity's Sunday School. The Drill Hall was Trinity's home until the Mansel Road site was acquired.

It was decided not to 'canvass' for children, anxious to avoid competition with other churches but the School grew steadily, and by 1887 the average attendance was twenty-seven.

Quite what a Sunday School session in 1884 was like we can now only imagine, but all the children were encouraged to learn the Shorter Catechism by heart. If you don't know the Catechism do look it up on Google. It contains 107 sections and it takes time to read, let alone learn and recite. (Not to be confused with the Larger Catechism which contains 196 questions!). Yet in 1886:

'The teaching of the Shorter Catechism is a prominent feature in the lesson system of the School and it is very satisfactory to the teachers that Eliza Moore, a child of seven years old, repeated the Catechism and was awarded the Bible given by the 'Committee of the Higher Instruction of Youth'.'

Eliza, or Lizzie as she was known, was just the first of many Trinity children - usually one or two a year - who learned the Catechism in those early days. They had to be word perfect to win the Bible - one boy made one mistake and had to start all over again. How different Sunday School, or Junior Church as it became, must have been then.
